

# Annual Overview




At [Treehouse](#), our approach is to walk alongside youth and support their unique needs. Together, we are creating a road to hope and possibility for youth in foster care in Washington state.

### Youth Served




### Primary Race



# Providing Essentials and Experiences

## Achievements

- Recognizing that young adults need support understanding and accessing services available to them, a Resource Navigator position was developed and will be established in the new program year.
- Streamlining processes this program year allowed for more time to be spent getting youth what they need quickly.

## Lessons Learned


- Youth and their support systems need more resources and connections to services that build skills in educational rights, legal rights, financial literacy, housing, basic needs, and physical and mental health. Providing this information will support young people into independence while honoring their unique needs.

# Advocating for Educational Rights



**Educational Advocacy** partners with a team of existing supports in a youth's life – caregivers, caseworkers, school staff, and community providers – to help resolve barriers and identify needed resources for the youth to make progress at school.

## Achievements

- By adjusting advocate caseloads and streamlining intake processes, we were able to better serve youth with complex, pressing needs despite a higher volume of referrals.
- Tools were refined to prioritize cases, ensuring that urgent referrals received timely support, even with limited capacity.

## Lessons Learned

- Prioritizing referrals based on urgency continues to be an important process to effectively manage caseloads and high demand for services.
- To serve the growing amount of advocacy cases, staff will operate remotely, providing virtual support in school meetings and trainings for social workers.

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Youth receive relevant academic support

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
Increase school stability and reduce absences

## Outcomes for Youth Served by Educational Advocacy

These outcomes contribute to the long-term impacts of removing major educational barriers for youth and increase the likelihood of youth reaching high school graduation.



# Partnering on the Path Towards Graduation

**Graduation Success** partners with youth who have experienced foster care and their existing support systems to create a plan for high school and beyond, develop support systems, connect to resources, and build self advocacy skills.

## Achievements

- Graduation Success tested a new assessment tool with a pilot group and created an implementation plan for fall 2025 rollout. This tool will help staff track how youth are progressing and adjust services to better meet individual needs.

## Lessons Learned

- We need to focus on the communities with the highest populations of youth we serve, which will enable us to focus on high-quality, in-person service.
- To best support youth transitioning beyond high school, Graduation Success should integrate with Launch Success to provide continuous, consistent support.


## Accessing resources

# Supporting Transitions into Adulthood



**Launch Success** continued Treehouse's partnership with youth after high school completion by providing ongoing access to goal setting, and financial and material resources.

## Achievements

- Feedback sessions were hosted with participants and staff to refine program offerings and ultimately center the experience of young adults.
- Participants expressed that they need support understanding programs available to them. In response, a Resource Navigator position was created to guide young adults to college, career, and housing,

## Lessons Learned

- To best support young people, we need to integrate Launch Success into Graduation Success. This will promote consistency and continuity and more readily address the needs of young adults as they transition out of high school and into independence.

**6,213** interventions with young adults related to the following:

**22%** Support or skill building

**16%** Setting goals

**7%** Addressing an urgent need

**5%** Connecting the young person to Treehouse services

**3%** Connecting the young person to outside services


Treehouse provides critical funding to Launch Success participants

**228** young adults received funding

**1,183** requests funded

**\$747** spent per young adult on average

Participants received funding across the following categories:



- 37% Stability funding  
*Housing, basic needs*
- 20% Extracurricular
- 13% Academic and career
- 10% Personal care
- 10% Transportation
